

Welcome to the March 2018 issue of the Arrow, the City Council's magazine for residents.

#### **66** Funding for councils has been in the national news recently with Northamptonshire **County Council effectively at** risk of bankruptcy.

It's worth noting that, despite its budget problems, Northamptonshire has only lost £180 in Government funding per household since 2011 while Nottingham households have lost more than three times that amount - £564.

We've worked hard to protect vital services for Nottingham people but with our main Government funding being cut by two-thirds since 2013, this is becoming increasingly difficult and tough decisions are having to be made.

The Government expects us to raise Council Tax by an extra 4% on top of a 1.99% basic increase this year to make up for a cut of £9 million in funding to provide services such as care for elderly and vulnerable people. But this will provide only a fraction of the funding so urgently needed.

We will continue to lobby the Government hard for the funding Nottingham needs and deserves.



Private tenants in Nottingham will benefit from better quality accommodation and greater protection from rogue landlords after the Government approved a new licensing scheme.

The City Council scheme covering over 90% of privately rented houses and flats in Nottingham – around 31,000 properties - is the largest outside London to be given approval by the Secretary of State.

It will mean that in selected areas of the city, landlords will need to obtain a licence from the council and meet certain obligations to ensure tenant safety and good management of the property.

The proposed cost of the licence is to be confirmed but is likely to be less than £2 per week, per property for accredited landlords and no more than £3 a week for nonaccredited landlords.

#### **Tackling** hazards

A report by the Building Research Establishment Group estimated that 21% of Nottingham's private rented properties are likely to have 'Category 1 hazards.' Examples of this type of hazard include exposed wiring, a dangerous boiler, cold bedrooms. a leaking roof, mould on walls or ceilings and vermin infestation. Selective Licensing will help ensure these issues are addressed.

Money raised through license fees will help to cover the cost of the scheme, which the council hopes to be able to introduce from summer this year. The cost of licensing will be reduced for responsible landlords who gain Nottingham Standard Accreditation.

Councillor Jane Urguhart, the City Council's Portfolio Holder for Planning, Housing & Heritage, said: "This is a major step forward in improving living standards for many city residents. In areas that are covered by the scheme it will help to improve standards for private tenants and landlords will know exactly what they must do to be able to rent their properties out.'

# BUILDING A BETTER NOTTINGHAM

How will the city change between now and 2020? The south side of the city centre is getting a BIG £250 million makeover... here's how it will look by 2020.



- A modern, bright new Broadmarsh car park and bus station with more spaces, electric charging points and solar panels
- Collin Street and upper Carrington Street will be pedestrianised, creating a welcoming, safe area with new shops and cafes
- A brand new flagship college for the city (home of the merged New College Nottingham and Central College Nottingham) will be built to the east of Middle Hill
- Nottingham Castle will also open in 2020 after a £30million revamp supported by Heritage Lottery Funding.









#### When will it be finished?

Work to revamp the shopping centre, build a new college, replace the Broadmarsh car park and bus station, and pedestrianise Collin Street are underway and due to be completed by Summer 2020.

#### How is this being paid for?

The £250 million investment into the Broadmarsh area is not coming from money from local council tax payers. The investment is expected to boost Nottingham's economy by over £1.1 billion per decade, create nearly 3,000 jobs and bring an extra three million people a year to the city.

A taxi revolution is underway in Nottingham as the city welcomes the launch of mytaxi – Nottingham's new taxi app on 1 March. Book licensed hackney cabs in just one tap for easy and safe travel around the city.

The council is making the city's hackney cab fleet one of the best and most modern in the country by investing in new-look eco-friendly vehicles. Having already introduced a Driver Improvement Penalty Point Scheme to drive up standards for passengers, the council will be placing orders for a number of stylish new Ultra Low Emission Vehicle (ULEV) models and investing in supporting charging infrastructure.

A smart new black-and-white livery will replace the existing green cabs, with the aim for all 411 hackney cabs in the city to be ULEV or Euro VI by 2020. This will help the city achieve its air quality standards and support any potential Clean Air Zone.

At the same time, the mytaxi app is being introduced, allowing passengers to book cabs from their smart phone, use cashless payment and have their journey and driver logged – making it easier and safer for everyone. To celebrate the launch, all mytaxi trips will be 50% off for the duration of March\*. Hackneys will still be able to be hailed in the street or caught at one of the city's taxi ranks, while minicabs will continue to need booking in advance.

Portfolio Holder for Community and Customer Services, Councillor Toby Neal, said: "For too long, taxis have been the poor relation in Nottingham's integrated transport network. That's all changing now, with better customer standards, smart new vehicles and a brand new

app to make it safe and easy for modern passengers to use the city's large fleet of hackney cabs. This is a really exciting transformation of taxi services in our city."

Andy Batty, Regional General Manager at mytaxi added: "By developing an integrated and environmentally friendly transport system, and working with international technology leaders such as mytaxi, Nottingham City Council have proved that they are serious about driving growth in a green and sustainable way. I can recall trying to get a taxi from Old Market Square on Millennium New Year's Eve and giving up to walk to Bramcote. The joy of finally hailing a green cab by the QMC was amazing! The mytaxi app will make this a thing of the past."

Robin Hood Energy is bringing energy prices down

Robin Hood Energy (RHE) is encouraging people to switch to them so that they can bring down their energy prices and help tackle fuel poverty in the city.

Since launching in September 2015, RHE has already signed up more than 118,000 customers attracted by their competitive tariffs.

Councillor Steve Battlemuch, Chair of the RHE Board said: "We're proud to be on a journey to help tackle fuel poverty and the more customers we have, the better the price we're able to offer. Being not-for-profit means we have no director bonuses or shareholder dividends to pay out and any surplus we do make will be ploughed back into the local community and to help customers save money".

Within months of RHE's launch, the East Midlands became the cheapest region in the country for dual fuel tariffs and prompted competitors to realign tariffs, benefiting the region overall. Credit customers have seen savings of up to £201 versus the average of the Big Six standard tariffs.\*

Publicly owned RHE was set up with a loan from Nottingham City Council that is being repaid at commercial interest rates. It is set to break-even by the end of March 2019, much sooner than other start-ups have achieved. RHE also provides local jobs for local people. In the last year, staff numbers have tripled with over 90% from Nottingham, creating jobs for local people.

## Southern Relief Route improvements underway

Junction improvement works started on Monday 12 February and will last for approximately eight weeks. The works will improve traffic flow on the Southern Relief Route, a key diversion route during the Broadmarsh area works.

To minimise traffic disruption, the works at the Waterway Street/Wilford Road and Castle Meadow Road/Wilford Road junctions will take place during off peak hours of 9.30am to 3.30pm Monday to Friday, with some weekend work with turning restrictions in the area.

When completed, this route will improve traffic flow by providing extra capacity at the two junctions on the Southern Relief Route, which is becoming a more important route in the city as a result of changes in the Broadmarsh area. Leader of the City Council, Councillor Jon Collins, said: "2018 is going to be a big year in this part of the City Centre and these improvements will help keep Nottingham moving whilst the Broadmarsh area redevelopment is taking place."

## Cleanerair

#### What should we be doing to improve air quality in Nottingham?

We may not always be able to see it but air pollution has serious, long-term effects on our health. Polluted air is bad for our lungs and it can also result in heart problems and cancer too. It is estimated that up to 2,000 people die prematurely each year as a result of air pollution in Nottingham. The main source of pollution is the transport network, which is why the council is focusing many of its air quality initiatives around reducing transport emissions.

Our fantastic local bus operators are investing in greener technologies and are upgrading their fleets to help improve air quality. The Workplace Parking Levy has helped fund public transport improvements including the expansion of the tram network. Each of the city's trams can carry up to 200 people and there are 4,500 free park and ride spaces on the tram network to ease traffic congestion.

Our Go Ultra Low project is helping to make the change to electric cars and supporting taxi drivers to find greener vehicles. There are now over 1,000 journeys a day on the Western Cycle Corridor due to improvements to cycle lanes and crossings.

### Better buses coming soon!

In February, we received £2.7m from the Government to upgrade 160 diesel buses.

The diesel buses are not that old, and still have many years of workable life left in them. Instead of replacing them with new vehicles, they will be retrofitted which will amend the exhaust on each bus to Euro VI standard (which is 90% cleaner than their current Euro V). Incredibly this will make each bus cleaner than a brand new diesel carl







Nottingham's light rail network has become a real success story with more people than ever travelling by tram

NET ranks as one of the best performing tram networks in the country but sometimes things don't quite go to plan. Councillor Sally Longford, the City Council's Portfolio Holder for Neighbourhood Services and Local Transport, visited Mike Mabey, Head of Operations, at NET's control room in Wilkinson Street to find out more.

#### Councillor Longford: "We see a lot in the media about tram delays – what are the facts?"

Statistics show 97 per cent of services in Nottingham run on time, which compares very favourably with other tram networks. For example, in 2017 there were 335,000 trips, of which 316,000 were on time. Every effort is made to avoid disruption and ensure any delays are kept to the absolute minimum.

Normal services usually resume within around 20 minutes.



Being at the heart of Nottingham's transport network we are very high-profile and, in today's age of social media and 24/7 news, even minor incidents can create the impression there's more disruption than there actually is.

#### "What can cause delays?"

Around three quarters of incidents are caused by factors completely outside our control, including road closures by the emergency services, non-tram related accidents or vehicles blocking the tracks. Also, when a customer is taken ill, we may need to halt a service and wait for an ambulance.

These incidents all tend to increase during the winter months.

#### "What happens when you become aware of incidents?"

Sophisticated technology enables us to quickly identify any problems and engineers are immediately dispatched if a tram or infrastructure fault is involved. We never proceed with any journey unless it's safe to do so.

Contingency plans are in place to help customers when issues arise, including arrangements with other transport operators so they can use tram tickets on appropriate buses and the deployment of additional staff onto the network to offer advice and assistance.

Customers value being kept informed and we provide upto-date information through our website, social media. passenger information displays and tram stop announcements.







## H@ODWINKED

They are taking part in Hoodwinked - Nottingham's unique public art trail - which will brighten the city from July to September.

The trail is a mischievous twist on the tale of Robin Hood, master of disguise. It transforms our iconic outlaw into robins designed and painted by an artist.
